



Oh, how wonderful it would be for them to use that same clout to deliver something wonderful, like meaningful like property tax reform ...

Wow: South Union Township continues to lead the county in economic growth, with its supervisors recently announcing approval of a plan to build a new Wal-Mart Supercenter, along with a possible department store and restaurant. Cedarwood Development of Ohio will construct the 435,000-square-foot facility, on the former county home property along New Salem Road. The news continues underscoring the wisdom of the former county commission administration in placing the longunderutilized land in the hands of the Fayette County Redevelopment Authority, which has developed the property at lightning speed.




